

6/01/05 <u>Leaving Mother Lake</u>, by Yang Erche Namu and Christine Mathieu. A memoir of growing up on the Chinese-Tibetan border in the late 60's to 70's, the author tells of the unique matrilineal Moso culture. Namu's story is of mothers and daughters and the forces that pull them apart and bring them together as well as the story of the author's growing up and changing cultures. 290 pages. Non-Fiction.

6/15/05 Time Traveler's Wife, by Audrey Niffenegger.

Henry De Tamble is an adventuresome librarian who involuntarily travels through time. He may disappear without warning to reappear in the past or future. Clare Abshire is an artist with whom he is in love. Alternating between points of view, this is a story on three levels: a science fiction concept, a character study, and a touching love story. The author explores the most complex ideas of life on all three levels, and does so admirably well. New York Times Bestseller and Today Show Book Club #15. 530 pages. Fiction.

7/06/05 Quite A Year for Plums, by Bailey White.

Bailey White is a popular radio commentator on NPR... Using an unusual, eccentric cast of characters with an understated storyline, she writes a joy of a book. The humor is dry, so pay attention if you don't want to miss anything. Reading this book is a bit like sitting on the front porch with friends and discussing the days events. This is not a book about plot, but it is about the characters who will touch your heart. 220 pages. Fiction.

7/20/05 Darkest Fear, by Harlan Coben.

This is the seventh in the Myron Bolitar series. "Deal Breaker" is the first. In this book Myron has a midlife encounter with issues of adulthood and mortality. A fast paced, multi-faceted read, this book grabs the heart and takes you on a roller coaster ride of emotions. You will see why Harlan Coben is a popular author. 319pages. Fiction.

Storytimes

STORYHOUR - Registration for the entire Fall period begins September 1st.

No Fee. Stories are read to the children for the first half-hour. The second half-hour is spent doing a small craft project related to that week's theme. **Pick up your theme list** during registration. Our storytellers ask that parents remain in the library during stories and help during craft time. Storyhour program begins the week of September 21. Storyhours are Wednesdays at 10:00am, and Thursdays at 10:00am and 1:00pm.

LAPSIT - Registration begins September 1st.

No Fee. For the children ages 18 to 36 months and lasts for about a half hour. Children are held in their parent's lap while both parent and child learn finger puppet plays, rhymes, and very simple stories. Lapsit runs from September 20 through November 8. Lapsit is Tuesdays at 10:00 am.
