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

Dannie Kohan lives her life by the numbers.


REBECCA SERLE

Troop 6000 by Nikita


Giselle Burgess, a young mother of five, and her children. along with others in

- 4. You will keep your reading passports with you for the summer, so do not lose them! The last day to register for the Reading Program and receive reading passports is: July 2.




- 5. Reach the set goal of 12 hours and you will be invited to our End Party for free books and extra prizes.

The Library will be asking for an operating millage of 0.9 mill for 8 years. This would generate about \$1,064,000 the first year, which would maintain current library operations while allowing for the expanded resources and updated services our growing community has asked us to provide.

What the Millage Will Do

Since first opening in 1966, Hamburg Township Library has steadfastly aimed to meet the needs of our growing community. In the eight years that have passed since the 2014 millage election, many advancements have emerged in both library services and technology offerings for library users. Keeping current with modern services comes with increased costs. An updated millage will enable Hamburg Township Library to uphold our commitment to providing access to essential resources to Hamburg residents.
