


Download Movies at Home

IVINGSTON READS 2008

THE WORST HARD TIME

by Timothy Egan

The Livingston County libraries have chosen *The Worst Hard Time: The Untold Story of Those who Survived the Great American Dust Bowl* by Timothy Egan as this year's Livingston Reads book. The program runs from February 1st to April 30th. You are encouraged to check out a copy of the book from your local public library and discuss it with your family, friends, coworkers, and neighbors. Each library will be hosting events in association with the book – check with your library, the local media, and www.livingstonreads.org for up-to-the-minute posting of events.

The devastation caused by Hurricanes Katrina and Rita serves as a grim reminder of the destructive power of nature and the long-term effects of a single storm. In *The Worst Hard Time*, Pulitzer Prize—winning journalist Timothy Egan brilliantly captures the untold story of the Dust Bowl, the decade of brutally punishing dust storms that ravaged the American High Plains during the Depression and became the "worst weather event" in American history, through the eyes of those who survived it.

The Worst Hard Time captures the full drama, heroism, and terror of this unwritten chapter of the Greatest Generation, a time when the simplest thing in life — taking a breath — was a threat. The book is a testament to the power of human perseverance in the face of the most wretched of conditions, as well as a reminder that the environmental catastrophe of the Dust Bowl may be only a preview of what is in store for us in our everwarming future.


