Registered kids may pick up their free yo-yo between February 13-19.

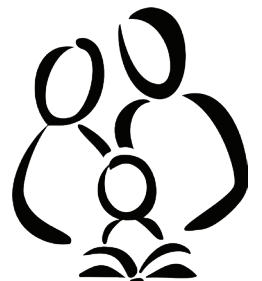

# A Book, A Movie, A Discussion Club



**February 24**

**Now Voyager**  
By Olive Higgins Prouty

Published in 1941, *Now Voyager* is a rich, deep portrait of the inner life of Boston blueblood Charlotte Vale. Living an unhappy, sheltered life, the dowdy, repressed and close to 40 Vale finds salvation in her nervous breakdown, where her treatment to rebuild her ravaged self-esteem uncovers her true intelligence and charm.



The 1942 film stars Bette Davis and Paul Henreid and was nominated for three Academy Awards and won for Best Music.

**March 24**

**Leave Her to Heaven**  
By Ben Ames Williams

Published in 1945, *Leave Her to Heaven* follows the radiantly beautiful Ellen and the talented author Harland, who is struck by Ellen's personality and strength. He is pulled into her life but he does not realize that evil can be disguised in glowing loveliness until tragedy ensues.



The 1945 film stars Gene Tierney and Cornell Wilde. Classic film noir, *Leave Her to Heaven* was nominated for four Academy Awards and won for Cinematography.

**April 21**

**Stella Dallas**  
By Olive Higgins Prouty

Published in 1923, *Stella Dallas* features Stella, who comes from a working class, less refined background but wishes to improve herself, or so she thinks. She charms the broken-hearted Stephen Dallas, but things do not turn out as either envisions. When their marriage fails they both want the best for her child, but Stella sacrifices the most in the end.



The 1937 version of the film starring Barbara Stanwyck. It was Stanwyck's favorite role and she was nominated for an Academy Award for acting.

**May 12: Laura by Vera Caspary**

Published in 1943, *Laura* is considered a crime novel but is really about Laura and her story. She is the ideal modern woman, ambitious, successful in business, elegant with a mysteriousness about her. Her murder is the center of the story and even a hard-boiled NYPD detective is not immune to Laura.

The 1944 film starred Gene Tierney, Dana Andrews, and Clifton Webb. It is quintessential film noir without getting bogged down in the crime itself, instead giving the story of the people involved. It was nominated for five Academy Awards and won for Best B&W Cinematography.

By Kate Moore

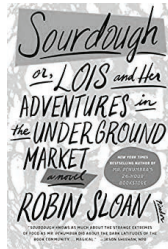

By Kent Haruf

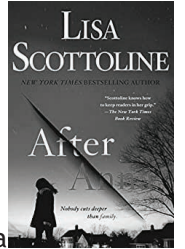

If you are a Hamburg Twp. resident who fits into this category, we can bring library materials to your home or you can have someone pick up the items for you!

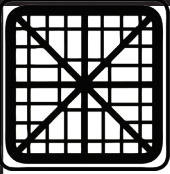
The service is free and you will get materials delivered once a month by a library staff member.

- Apply for a library card online
- eBooks, eAudio, online magazines and access to MeL (statewide item borrowing)
